

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#### Introduction:



All are tried and tested on the dance floor and many have been recorded on my two solo CDs - Gingerbread and Moonshine and Outside of the Square.

#### 15 Dollar Coke




hile travelling in France many years ago I ordered a large drink of coke. Little did I realise that a large drink was made up from 4 small and expensive ones!

tune is revised from long ago and at last given a name. It's dedicated to Philippa - my niece from Lymm.





etimes, when I have a Blue Day, I just pick up this tune and wring out every ounce of joy, and then I feel much better!




Popped out to organise the Church Flowers and came back with this tune instead.


